We have a robust district team. We have worked with the Coquille Tribe to receive feedback on how this would impact their students and families specifically. We have surveyed all families in our district about re-opening and this includes EL, TAG, Sp.Ed., Economically Disadvantaged etc. Survey responses were used to revise the plan. The draft plan was shared on our website and Facebook. We again surveyed K-3 families about potential re-opening plans and considered those responses as plans were developed. The Board reviewed and solicited feedback on two occasions (the second time included provisions for Comprehensive Distance Learning to begin the year if metrics are not met for in-person reopening as well as K-3 exception opening) prior to approval on August 10, 2020.

Comprehensive Distance Learning is being selected due to the metric data that was released on December 12, 2020 that moved us into the red category. We will continue in CDL until our county COVID data puts us back in the yellow.

At this point we have reviewed the CDL Guidance both as an administrative team as well as our district-wide planning team. We feel we can meet all requirements within this guidance and do not need ODE to review any requirements for possible accommodations.

Comprehensive Distance Learning is the District's plan beginning September 15, 2020 for at least the first 9-weeks of school or until the state and county metrics are being met for on-site and/or hybrid instruction.

Our plan includes 1:1 Chromebook roll out for students in grades 7-12. We will be utilizing Google Classroom. For the small number of students that have connectivity issues we will still deploy Chromebooks to them but we will be placing their lessons on flash drives, including lesson recordings, so they can get as much of the similar instruction as their counterparts. These students will also receive paper packets when needed. We will continue to work with our network and cellular carriers on connectivity issues and use our CDL Grant money to resolve issues as we are able.

We will begin the school year with CDL and we will begin Hybrid Learning once we have met both county and state level metrics for on-site in-person opening.
